


It is an odd energy to be saying hello and good-bye at the same time! The next months together will be about bring-

It's been a tough year. And sometimes it feels like we're working really hard just to survive. Many of you are tired and discouraged. But I'd like you to look back and see just what you have accomplished in this year of crisis. In the October Call, I listed the Board's goals for the year and asked for your help. Below is the list. Look how well we have done!

-Completing the goals of this interim period – developing our unique covenant, mission and vision. (Thanks to Joani Neirenberg, Paul Schmidt, BJ Shabel, Mugs Johnon –-and formerly Kevin Brown, Libby Vesilind and Rich Greenlee--this was done at a well-attended congregational meeting on April 7th).

-Offer weekly, meaningful Sunday services. (Done -thanks to Marty Shaw, Ginger Wallis and ministers from throughout the Northern New England District).

-Acknowledge our need for our own sacred space by searching for temporary rental venues while planning for a permanent home. (Thanks to all of those who helped to make our move to LUMC a successful experiment, whether or not we decide to return in September).

-Enhance thoughtful, informative, clear and inspired communication using a broad range of modes. (We have the Call, Weekly Blasts, congregational meetings and potlucks. We can always do better, but we're trying).

-Initiate conversations about our beloved community, acknowledging our sorrow and healing our pain from the recent loss of so many of our members due to death, moves, or mandate and using the opportunity to explore our values with intention, honesty, and depth. (We have had wonderful conversations about our covenant, mission and vision, our worship space and our past).

-Fulfill our legal and moral obligations to Lee during her illness. (Rev. Lee, the District and the UUA have all expressed their appreciation for our balancing the needs of our congregation with fairness and compassion for Lee).

-Ensure that there is a full slate of board members and committee chairs by the annual meeting. (Thanks to Lori Fortini and her team for working to accomplish this task).

-Practice Joy with intentionality. (Have you noticed the big smiles and lots of laughter that attend our every gathering)?

Our last goal was to ensure our financial stability by supporting fundraising efforts and providing support and guidance to the Stewardship Campaign. Sally Page, Lori Fortini, Rich Greenlee, Mary Layton and many others have raised \$16,000 this year with fun events. Claudia Kern and Suzanne Simon have created an annual campaign that married pie, conversation and requests for financial support of our community in the spirit of true stewardship. We will report the results at our annual meeting on May 19th.

All of your hard work is, in fact, moving us forward. Our numbers are not yet growing, but a deeper understanding of our community is. Thank you!

Marmots and Mosquitos Are Adapting, How Can We? --A Five-Part Program

Please join Ginger Wallis at the Meeting House for five Wednesday evenings from 7 – 9:15 PM starting June 12th. The sessions include:

1) Active Hope: share worries for the future and visions for a better future. 2) Climate Adaptation: hear stories of other species' adaptation strategies and explore highlights of climate adaptation plans from other places in a small group activity to understand the concept of adaptation. 3) Energy: play Lose 5,000 Pounds of Carbon in Twenty Turns, a board game, which reminds us of energy saving habits, dispels myths, and conveys the actions that make the most impact. 4) Indirect Use of Energy: move in small groups through stations that convey concepts related to the products we purchase as well as ideas for alternative gifting and shopping. 5) Vulnerabilities: explore ways to lessen risks from heat exhaustion, heat stroke, Lyme disease for examples and gain tips for home emergency planning.

Each session includes time to share what we can do and how we can be role models, and each session includes time

Book Review

Waking Up in Time : Finding Inner Peace in a Time of Accelerating Change

By Peter Russell

Visionary scientist Peter Russell updates his classic manifesto for awakening to the mounting planetary crisis even while deepening our connection to inner tranquility. Russell powerfully demonstrates the need for a spiritual renaissance in the face of the dangers of ever-accelerating change.

The first part of the book talks about the increasing pace of life. The second part explores our inner needs and the way society has seduced us into false assumptions about what we really want. The third part addresses how we can wake up and be more in the present. The fourth section looks at where we may be headed if we don't change.

He feels that any change in this world can only come from change from within our own selves. (An aside: I am reminded of this when I see a store window sign: "Help wanted: Inquire within." That says it all.)

We may be accelerating ourselves toward annihilation or toward the climax of evolution. The answer is within us. Russell feels it will be our success or failure to develop inwardly that will determine which path we take.

Women's Group has met since 2005 and our goal has remained the same – to relax, get to know each other better, and to keep it simple!


